DESCRIPTION: (General description of district as a whole and boundaries)

The Main Street District is primarily residential in character, centering around Main and Broad Streets, two north-south corridors. The oldest structures, as well as the finest, are concentrated along Main Street where large lots and setbacks add to the visual dominance of the street. A composite of 19th century building forms and architectural styles are found in the district, from vernacular Greek Revival cottages to large Queen Anne houses. A few churches and public buildings are also included in the district. Construction tends to be frame, though there are a few brick structures. The mature trees and vegetation are an important asset, adding substantially to the character of the district.

The district is distinctive for its lack of serious intrusions; deterioration of individual houses and improper alterations pose the most serious threat to the integrity of the area.

The district boundaries are derived from published maps of Keyport from 1851, 1860, and 1873, and by the architectural integrity of the surrounding areas. They are: (see map)

South: Maple Place- North side only from Beers Street to Main Street
Main Street- Both sides from Maple Place to Elizabeth Street
Elizabeth Street- Both sides from Main Street to Broad Street
North side only from Broad Street to Osborn Street

East: Osborn Street- Both sides from Elizabeth Street to Third Street

North: Third Street- South side only from Osborn Street to Main Street
Main Street- West side only from Third Street to Barnes Street
Barnes Street- South side only from Main Street to Kearney Street

West: Kearney Street- Both sides from Barnes Street to Short Street
Short Street- South side only from Kearney Street to Beers Street
Beers Street- East side only from Short Street to Maple Place

SIGNIFICANCE EVALUATION:

The Main Street District comprises Keyport's premier residential area of the 19th century. Houses were built along Main Street soon after Keyport was founded in 1830, and the area developed perpendicularly to the commercial area along Front Street and the waterfront. The early concentration of building occurred on Main Street and on the parallel streets, Kearney and Broad. Later construction consisted of infill on surrounding streets further removed from the commercial center. Many of the major figures in the economic, social, and political life of the town maintained residences in the district.

The district contains a full range of domestic architectural styles and building forms. Working class housing, double houses, 3 bay vernacular middle class homes, and large high style homes can be found in styles including Greek Revival, Italianate, Second Empire, and Queen Anne. Significant and representative structures are recorded on individual forms.

The Main Street District is notable as an early residential area of Keyport. With its concentration of earlier and higher style residences, it stands out from the surrounding development. The lack of intrusions and the integrity of the existing structures make this district a particularly good example of 19th century residential development.

An awareness among the residents of the value of the neighborhood is growing, though at present, preservation activity is limited to the efforts of individual owners.

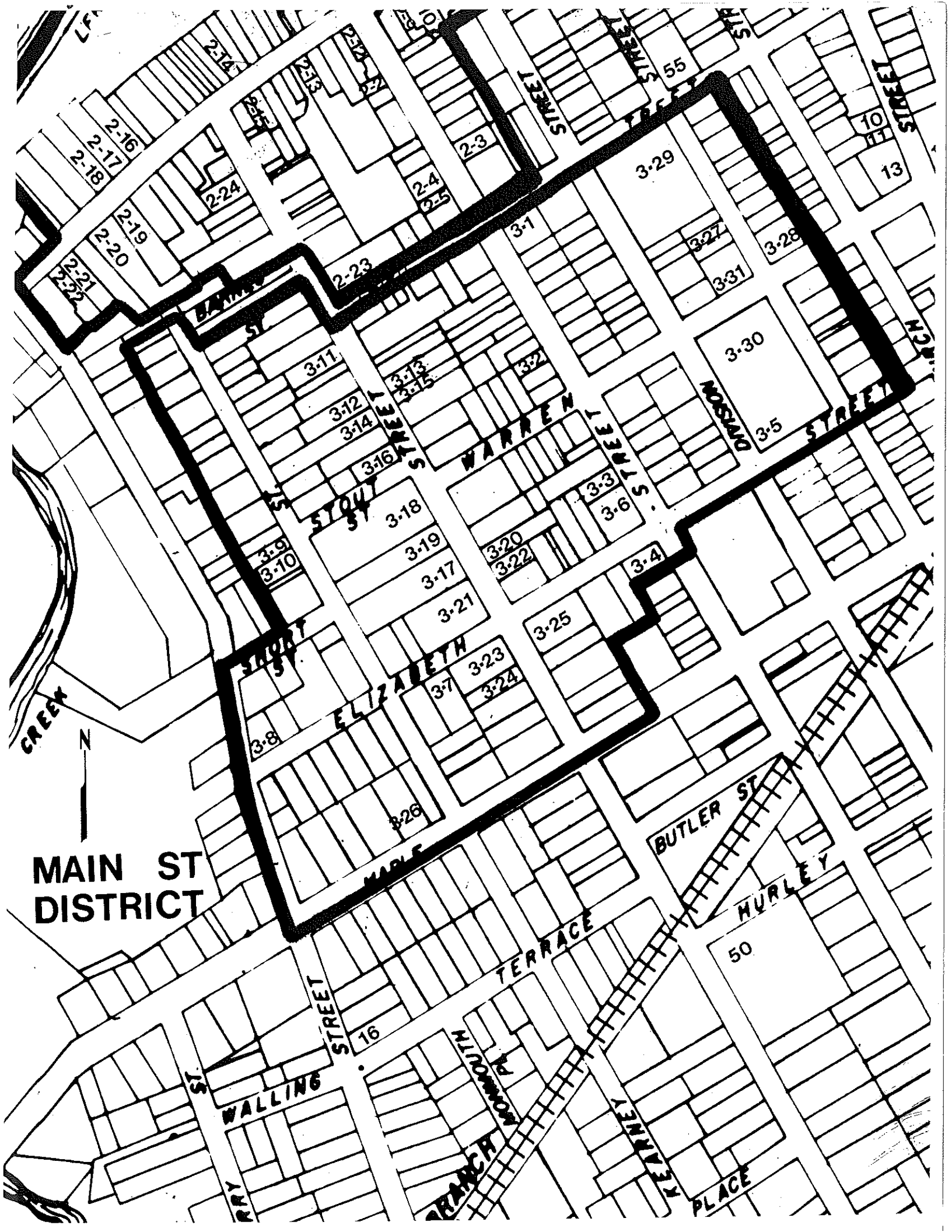

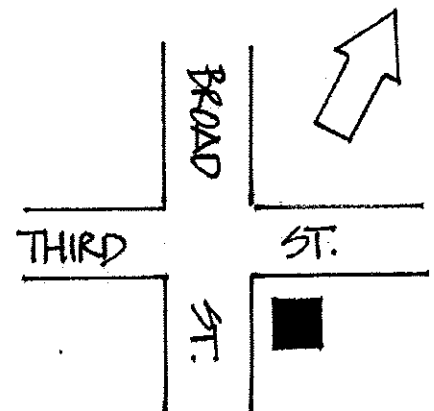
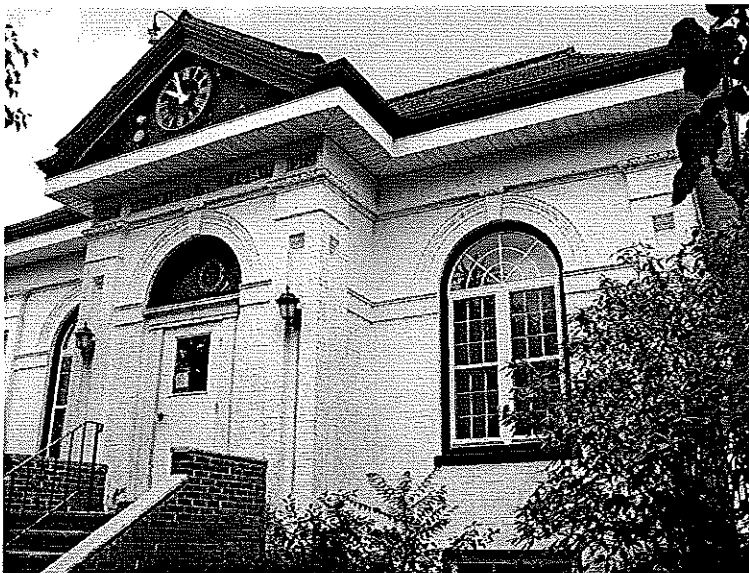

2006 update: New 20th C. steel door at entrance; synthetic frieze band and tar shingles on roof; addition to north side exterior (gabled portico supported by square piers, over stairs leading into basement); 6/6 sash windows.

As a part of the Main Street District, this civic building has served as a library for the community of Keyport since its construction in 1913. The Classical Revival elements are still in good condition and the Keyport Public Library is an excellent example of that type of civic building in Monmouth County.

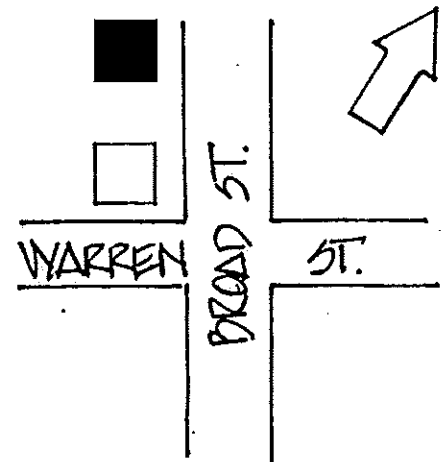

Although specific features have been altered, this house, as well as many structures in the Main Street District, retains integrity of form. It is an example of the earlier, more modest cottage type dwellings in this district. Map research showed that T. Marshall owned the house in 1851; J.B. Harris (blacksmith) in 1860; and J. Harris in 1873.

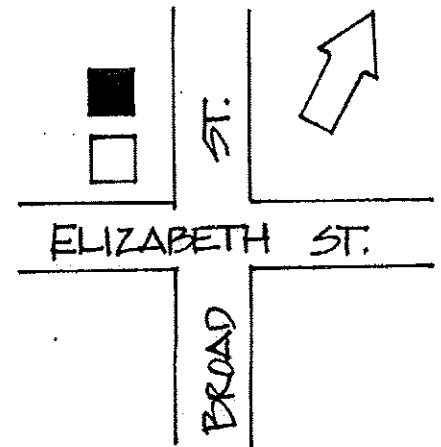

SIGNIFICANCE EVALUATION:

This brick dwelling is a fine example of a stately Greek Revival residence, more of which began popping up on the south side of Broad Street in the mid 19th century. The owner of this house, T.S.R. Brown, was a mason, oyster planter, owned the Chingarora Dock in the 1880's, and owned a coal and building supply store. He was a member of the General Assembly from 1867-1868, as well as Vice President of the Monmouth Battle Monument Assembly, chosen freeholder for Raritan Twp., director of the First National Bank of Keyport (1322-2-25). He later moved to the house immediately south at 1 Elizabeth Street (1322-3-6) between 1860 and 1873. By 1873, Cornelius Brown lived in this house.

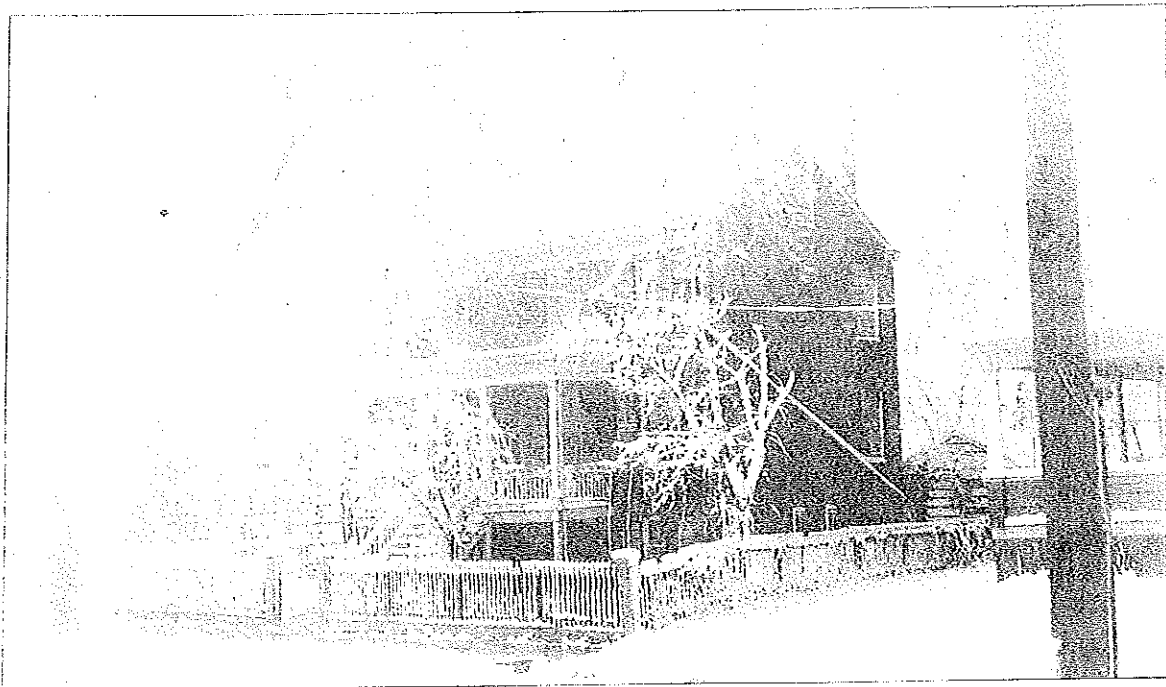

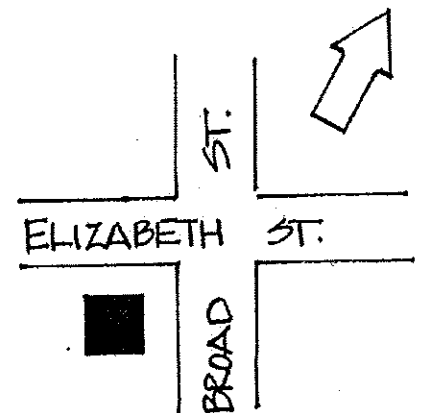

The 3-bay symmetrical house type (plus wing) in the Greek Revival style is popularly seen in Keyport throughout the 19th century. G.S. Crawford is shown as the owner of this house on the 1860 map; S.J. Crawford in 1873; A. Parksett in 1889.

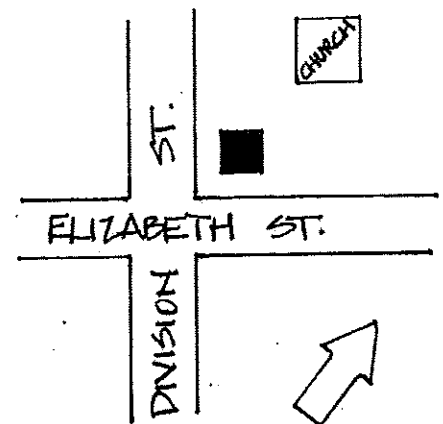

The Dutch Parsonage was used in the 19th century and is still used today as the residence for the Dutch Reformed congregation's clergy members. It has seen a few alterations but none that damage its integrity of historical importance or its integrity of form and style. This Greek Revival structure stands as a testament to the tradition of building in that style throughout much of the later 19th century in Keyport.

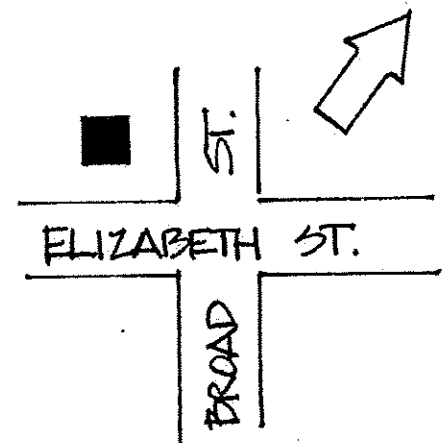

It retains an integrity of form and serves as an excellent example of Italianate detailing on the residences in Keyport. T.S.R. Brown formerly lived in the house immediately north at 162 Broad Street (1322-3-3). The 1873 Atlas shows him as owner of this house; in 1889 the owner was A.M. Brown (presumably a relative).
